Why Girl Scouts?

Although I was never a Girl Scout, I was introduced to scouting by my sister who was a Girl Scout up until Junior High school. When her daughter became a Girl Scout, I ended up taking my niece to all of her meetings and became a "Girl Scout Mom."

How did you become a part of Troop 6000?

I met Giselle through Meridith Maskara. Giselle asked me to volunteer with Troop 6000. I saw some girls were struggling with their homework and offered to volunteer as a tutor. Through their work, I became a troop leader of a Brownie troop in Queens, and am now co-currently a troop leader of Troop 6000 girls in Astoria. Volunteering for Troop 6000 and working with families that were experiencing homelessness was something I had never experienced before. It was a learning curve for me. I became very close to the girls who joined the first troop in Long Island City and I continue to be very invested in Troop 6000.

What's Your Story?

I was raised by a single mom, I had one sibling. My Dad was an alcoholic, and eventually, my Mom packed us up and left my Dad. My Mom wanted to do more with her life and provide a better future for my sister and me. She applied to Law School, got accepted, and we moved to a College Town surrounded by positive female leaders.

Toni is a stage manager by trade and has worked on Broadway as a Child Wrangler for "Caroline," as a Merchandise Manager for "Rent," and as a Stage Manager, for "The Blue Man Group."

What advice do you have for new leaders?

USE RESOURCES WISELY – Go online, research how other troops are doing it, and figure out how to tailor lessons to your groups' specific needs. Also, If you see that there are parents that seem like they want to be involved in Girl Scouting and have the right temperament, reach out to them.

What challenges do you experience as a Troop 6000 leader?

- 1. Adapting to multi-age level learning. Our troops consist of Daisies, Brownies, Juniors, and Cadettes, that are all at different developmental stages and levels of learning. It can be a challenge to create lessons that will engage every age group. When we are working on badges, we create 2 lesson plans, one lesson plan for Daisies and Brownies and one for Juniors and Cadettes. This helps to keep the girls engaged.
- **2. Competition for space.** At our site, we are continually competing with the recreational program that takes place at the same time. The noise from this program can sometimes be a distraction for my girls. We now put a blanket over the windows. Girls have less visual distractions this way.

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3. Fatigue. There are times when I feel like I am going to burn out and when that happens, I take a day off to recoup (and play video games. My video favorite game is The Lego Hobbit on Wii).
